




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

The Concept

The Regional Recreation Areas Plan consists of a system of existing, developing and proposed regional recreation areas in Los Angeles County that together would satisfy the anticipated needs of the projected 1985 population.

The purpose of this plan is to suggest the types of regional recreation areas, their number, the amount of required area and the generalized location of new sites which will be necessary to provide an adequately varied regional recreation program for a metropolitan population. It provides an overall view of the county's future public recreation needs without regard to jurisdictional boundaries and includes almost all types of recreational areas.

The accompanying map shows the physical scope of the plan in relation to major land forms and uses by indicating the distribution of all regional recreation areas, their approximate size and location.



INTRODUCTION TO THE PLAN

A regional recreation area is an extent of land and/or water surface which, by its unique features and/or unusual or extensive development, offers recreational opportunities that attract visitors from beyond the immediate vicinity without regard to physical, political or community boundaries. These regional attractions are generally beyond the scope of local park programs for one or more of the following reasons: (1) they provide recreation services or contain certain features which are of interest to more than the local community; (2) they are larger in area than that required to meet neighborhood or community recreation needs; (3) they require unusual or extensive development normally beyond the capability of the local community.

The plan is a part of the recreation element of the General Plan of the County of Los Angeles which also consists of plans for small craft harbors, the shoreline, riding and hiking trails and local parks. Except for the plan of local parks, these sub-elements have been incorporated into the Regional Recreation Areas Plan.

This report, apart from the officially adopted definitions, standards, and map is a summary of the studies, planning and findings of the Regional Planning Commission and only reflects the detailed information maintained on file in the offices of the Commission. Specific information about many of the sites and facilities listed herein may be obtained by directing an inquiry to the

noted operating agency or to the Regional Planning Commission.

This restudy reaffirms the objectives of the original Regional Recreation Areas Plan as adopted in 1959 and reflects the further development and enhancement of those objectives in at least three significant ways:

1. A fuller measure of agreement among the many and various jurisdictions in the county has been reached with special regard for determination of present and future needs for regional recreation areas and facilities.
2. Applicable standards for additional categories of regional recreation areas have been established and the existing standards have been further refined and reestablished in accord with current understanding of needs and use of regional recreation areas and facilities.
3. This plan is more comprehensive than the original in that the total number of areas identified in the plan is more than double the previous number and includes a wider range of recreational areas and facilities identified as having regional significance.



This plan therefore more explicitly reflects the broadening concept of what constitutes "recreation" itself and the desirable program of providing necessary areas and facilities for such "recreation" on a regional basis.



The Responsibility for Providing Regional Recreation Areas

The providing of regional recreation areas is primarily the responsibility of the County of Los Angeles. However, other public agencies at all levels of government share the responsibility as well. This plan recognizes the responsibility of both by designating the agency responsible for or most likely to be responsible for the acquisition, development, operation and maintenance of each respective area and facility. A part of the total need of course will be satisfied by non-public areas and facilities and this plan reflects that by designating the known private agencies and operators as in the case of golf courses.

The Dilemma and Need to Act

Los Angeles County enjoys several enviable advantages over many metropolitan areas, for example, mild climate, varied topography, dynamic and expanding economy, large area (over 4,000 square miles) and good circulation through an extensive freeway and highway system. The opportunities for establishing regional recreation areas are therefore numerous and varied. However, sites available for acquisition within the urban area are limited and rapidly dwindling as urban development expands. As development spreads the need for recreation land increases and because land costs also rise--in some cases spectacularly--the problem of acquisition becomes increasingly critical. This plan recognizes the dilemma and urges all reasonable haste in further development of a recreation land acquisition program.

The Making of a Plan for Action

The focus of this plan is first on regional recreation areas within the urban and urbanizable areas, close to the concentrations of population, and second on rural and permanently open portions of the county. The plan identifies and recommends acquisition of a wide enough variety of regional recreation areas to satisfy the recreational needs of virtually all the ten million people anticipated by 1985.

Commercial recreation areas have generally been excluded from this plan except when: (1) they comprise a part of a publicly owned recreation complex; (2) they may be acquired in the future by a public agency, as in the case of golf courses; or (3) they are essential to the use of a recreational resource, as in the case of winter sports areas in the Angeles National Forest.

The cities in Los Angeles County and agencies of the County, State and Federal governments concerned with providing regional recreation facilities participated in reviewing the original Regional Recreation Areas Plan, refining the criteria for placing areas on the plan and suggesting additional areas to meet the established criteria. The review and suggestions resulted in many recreational areas being added to the plan, particularly those within the Angeles National Forest recommended by the United States Forest Service. The Forest Service recommendations were based upon a comprehensive reevaluation of the use of national forest lands as a part of the Outdoor Recreation Resources Review Commission's recent studies; consequently, there are more than twice as many areas on the current plan as were on the Regional Recreation Areas Plan adopted in 1959.

Recreation Areas to Meet the Needs

The locational and demand standards utilized in the formulation of this plan apply to open space type urban recreation areas and do not apply to cultural interest areas such as historical sites and museums or to the natural resource preservation and wilderness experience type recreation areas. Such areas and facilities generally are not planned or created but exist much by accident, incident or circumstance and the number and size of such sites may not appropriately be subjected to demand standards.

The standards that are used in the plan are applicable to those major recreation areas that are or will be an integral part of the urban environment and constitute the primary criteria for determination of needs and demands for such major recreation areas for the region as a whole. These standards therefore apply to the recreational opportunities usually indigenous to regional parks, recreation parks, beaches, golf courses, roadside rests, vista points, scenic drives and other areas within the existing or anticipated urban portions of the county.

In order to take advantage of the recreational opportunities provided by such areas and facilities, the greater majority of patrons will devote a number of hours or the better part of a day, including travel time, to such

recreational activity. The term "day use" therefore is applied to these areas. While many of the natural resource areas within the county are also utilized on a "day use" basis, this type of area or facility generally constitutes a highly unusual recreation experience and does not lend itself to standardization and duplication.

The general planning standard applied in the preparation of this plan is six acres of regional recreation area, in the urban and urbanizable areas, per thousand persons. This is in addition to any neighborhood and community recreation area which should comprise an additional four acres per thousand, for a total of ten acres of recreation space per thousand persons. Based on the population projection of ten million people for Los Angeles County, it will be necessary to provide 60,000 acres of regional recreation areas. This plan indicates a total of approximately 75,000 acres in existing, developing and proposed day use regional recreation areas.

Specific planning standards as to the number of persons to be served and the recommended size in acres have been applied to recreation parks and golf courses. These standards are presented in the section of the report which lists all the areas of each type found on the plan.



Classification System

The regional recreation areas identified in this plan are divided into five major classes: Regional Park, Recreation Park, Reservation, Scenic Drive and Specialized Facility. The specialized facility classification is further divided into twenty-seven types of areas.

1. A **regional park** is a major park that offers recreational opportunities of a nature or of such wide variety that it attracts people in the widest possible range of age and interest and generally serves the population living within a radius distance of approximately one hour's drive.



2. A **recreation park** is a major park oriented toward active recreational uses, providing facilities associated with sports centers such as sports fields, courts, courses, pools, gyms and ranges.



3. A **reservation** is an extent of land preserved from development in order to protect scenic resources, unusual native plants and animals, geologic phenomena or open spaces that would enhance or complement the recreational function of an adjacent or nearby recreation area.



4. A **scenic drive** is an extent of highway or local road which affords visual enjoyment of nature either undisturbed or enhanced by the incidental or designed efforts of man.



5. A **specialized facility** is a singular recreational facility of regional significance. It may be an individual element such as a historical site or it may be a unit of a larger or more inclusive regional recreation area. The specialized facilities recognized in this plan are identified under the following five sub-classifications:

Status of Development

Each regional recreation facility or area has been classified as to status of development and an entry of (E) (D) or (P) indicating this has been included following the name of each item. Such entry is to be interpreted as follows:

(E)




An "existing" regional recreation area is one upon which all or a substantial portion of the contemplated uses have been established, whether fully developed or not;

(D)




A "developing" regional recreation area is either:

1) Land committed for regional recreational use, but upon which none or almost none of the uses contemplated have been established; or



2) An established regional recreation site at which a major portion of the total acreage has yet to be acquired for or committed to such use;

*(P)



A "proposed" regional recreation area is land that has been proposed for regional recreation use, but upon which no commitment for such use has been made. Areas in the National Forest may be so designated if at present no specific recreation use is in effect.

*The entry (P) proposed is not to be construed as merely a suggestion for future consideration, but is rather an integral part of the total plan reflecting serious consideration and application of criteria and/or standards to each such entry. The proposed regional recreation areas in this plan constitute minimal additions which must be acquired and/or developed in order to adequately provide broadly based and diversified recreation for the anticipated 1985 population.

THE PLAN IN SUMMARY

While the possibilities for establishing regional recreation areas within Los Angeles County are numerous and varied, actual site acquisitions have become increasingly difficult as urban development continues in an ever-expanding pattern. Though need for recreation land tends to increase proportionate to population growth, the cost of such land tends to increase even more rapidly resulting in an ever more difficult problem of land acquisition. This plan recognizes the problem and recommends an accelerated program of acquisition of recreation lands.

The following summary indicates the present state of the plan and what further acquisitions are required in order to fulfill the total plan. Chart No. 4 demonstrates that bold and even dramatic action is required if Los Angeles County is to have and maintain recreation lands required by present and future inhabitants of this, the second largest urban complex in the United States.

^a The plan includes an additional 35,780 acres proposed for Natural Reservations but which will not require public acquisition in order to maintain the land as such. 32,280 acres are in the National Forest and 3,500 acres of reservation lands privately owned.

4 Summary of day use acreage: Day use recreation areas are considered to be subject to the application of demand need standards. The plan proposes a minimum of 6 acres of such areas per 1,000 persons. The illustrations to the right indicate the current deficiency in day use areas and emphasize the need for action to eliminate the deficiency over the next twenty years.

The existing developed acreage is far short of minimum standards. At present there is a serious deficiency of over 13,000 acres.

By 1985, the need will have increased by another 18,000 acres to serve an estimated population of 10 million.

If only the acreage now developing is added to that presently existing, there will still be a deficiency of over 13,000 acres in 1985.

Therefore, it is essential to acquire the acreage proposed in this plan and develop at least enough acreage for the 1985 population.

REGIONAL PARKS

A regional park is a major park that offers recreational opportunities of a nature or of such wide variety that it attracts people in the widest possible range of age and interest and generally serves the population living within a radius distance of approximately one hour's drive. It contains extensive area, usually exceeding fifty acres, and offers unusual recreational attractions or a combination of two or more specialized facilities. Each of the attractions or facilities within the park is of major significance and together they offer both active and passive recreational opportunities.

The total area in existing, developing and proposed

regional parks identified in the plan ranges from 40,000 to 45,000 acres. The difference in area is due to the fact that the ultimate size of some of the developing and proposed parks has not yet been determined.

The regional parks listed herein include such well known parks as Griffith Park, Big Pines Recreation Area, Carrillo Beach State Park and others. Of greater significance in terms of the plan however, is the listing of those parks soon to be developed such as Castaic and the designation of future sites that will not become realities for some time but which should be recognized, identified and planned for now.

RECREATION PARKS

A recreation park is a major park oriented toward active recreational uses, providing facilities associated with sports centers such as sports fields, courts, courses, pools, gyms and ranges. However, it may also offer incidental passive recreational areas and local park facilities, such as a small picnic area and playground, which are not in themselves of regional significance. It is designed to handle large-scale multiple participant sports programs and can accommodate tournament competition. It is usually not less than fifty acres in size and often comprises the active recreation element of a regional park.

A recreation park should provide facilities for a comprehensive recreational program to serve a population of approximately 200,000. In locating potential re-

creation parks particular care has been taken to supplement, rather than duplicate, available recreational facilities of nearby high schools, colleges, and universities.

In order to attain the standard of one recreation park per 200,000 persons approximately fifty such parks would be needed in Los Angeles County by 1985. This plan shows thirty-three existing and developing and twenty-six proposed recreation parks which represent a reasonable minimum for the anticipated population. Eighteen of these parks have been planned as elements of regional parks in order to concentrate regional recreation facilities and minimize land acquisition and administrative costs. The total area of the forty-one separate recreation parks is approximately 5,700 acres.

RESERVATIONS

A reservation is an extent of land preserved from development in order to protect: (1) scenic resources, (2) unusual native plants and animals, (3) geologic phenomena, or (4) open space that would enhance or complement the recreational function of an adjacent or nearby recreation area. Development should be limited to access and comfort facilities and use should be limited to general viewing, nature study, hiking and riding and incidental picnicking and camping.

Mountain, desert and beach areas are included in the reservation category. This plan recognizes only those areas which have been or are intended to be set aside for recreational purposes as distinguished from areas set aside for other purposes, such as flood control

debris basins, watersheds and water impounding areas. Reservation areas included within regional parks are not identified separately and, therefore, are not listed in this section. The reservations identified in the plan contain a total of approximately 125,000 acres.

Because of the vast areas of the county that are in public ownership, predominantly the National Forests, the majority of the area listed herein is now existing and available to the public. But this only serves to point up the desirability, indeed the necessity for concentrating on the acquisition of those critical areas located in the urban areas of the County not held in public ownership.



SCENIC DRIVES

A scenic drive is an extent of highway or local road which affords visual enjoyment of nature either undisturbed or enhanced by the incidental or designed efforts of man. Roadside rests and vista points should be provided as integral parts of a scenic drive to permit sight-seers to park and enjoy the scenery from the side of the road as well as from the automobile. While roads leading through large parks may offer scenic experience most of them are not specifically identified as scenic drives but are considered in this plan as incidental features of those parks. The exceptions are the Elysian Park and Griffith Park drives which are considered scenic attractions of sufficient importance to be identified separately.

This plan represents in part, Los Angeles County's share of the national interest in preservation and enhancement of "scenic beauty". Recent federal legislation and pending state legislation offer encourage-

ment and some financial incentive to implement the plan. An inherent aspect of this particular segment of the plan in contrast to nearly all other segments is the requirement for effective control of the privately owned properties adjacent to the "scenic drive".

In certain instances the acquisition of lesser interests--scenic easements, access rights, etc.--or the imposition of covenants and restrictions on property disposed of could be utilized to help meet the planned objectives as expressed in this plan.

Approximately 700 miles of roads are designated as scenic drives in this plan, of which 260 miles are within the Angeles National Forest. Many of the scenic drives indicated as proposed are actually existing roads on which the scenic qualities have not yet been fully developed.



SPECIALIZED FACILITIES

A specialized facility is a singular recreational facility of regional significance. It may be an individual element such as a historical site or it may be a unit of a larger or more inclusive regional recreation area. It is to be emphasized that many of the areas or facilities listed herein are not subject to an application of standards based on population or size of service area or need but are included because they are inherently unique and are of regional significance in contrast to local or limited significance.


It is precisely because of the test of regional significance that this classification includes certain specific facilities not otherwise classified as a separate category. The swimming stadium in Exposition Park is an example of this. There are a large number of Olympic size pools in the county but one alone is unique in that it has spectator stands with a very large capacity (5,000) and because of location and relationship to other facilities in Exposition Park is used for major swimming and diving events. Thus, it has been separated out and listed separately under Stadiums as the only such pool possessing regional significance. This general principle has been the primary determinant for selection and inclusion of each area or facility in this plan.

Specialized facilities encompass a wide range, from Winter Sports Areas of thousands of acres to small picnic spots and from the Memorial Coliseum seating 94,000 spectators to a Vista Point able to accommodate only a few viewers.

The plan identifies a total of 286 existing, developing or proposed areas and recognizes that additional items may be warranted as conditions and circumstances may determine.

This plan places such specialized facilities in five sub-classifications as follows:

Outdoor Activity Areas

Picnic Grounds are areas, usually located within parks, generally equipped with tables, cooking and comfort facilities to permit enjoyment of outdoor eating as a part of an outdoor recreational experience. Picnic areas are found within most parks, both local and regional, but this plan itemizes only major picnic areas which are regional attractions. Sites identified within the Angeles National Forest provide a rustic setting and usually consist of groupings of smaller picnic grounds.



Campgrounds are areas in which overnight outdoor living is emphasized. These facilities are usually located in the mountains or foothills but some have been developed or proposed in the desert and shoreline areas as well. Site development should include water, comfort facilities, a stove and table and in general be commensurate with the degree of "roughing it" that the location and accessibility suggests.

"Camping out" is a great tradition that has grown in interest apparently as a concomitant of the increased urbanization of our society. This plan recognizes the great need for facilities and areas for camping and shows all known public campgrounds and proposes a number of additions. This plan further recognizes that readily accessible facilities always tend to be much more crowded than the remote ones and proposes a dispersion of campgrounds that will tend to more likely balance the total use while retaining some as extremely rugged and remote for the very hardy camper.

The really critical factor is not so much a lack of campgrounds, except for the shoreline in summer, but rather the lack of development. This plan proposes that development continue at an accelerated pace.



Day Camps are activities in which supervised groups of young children visit rustic or wilderness-type areas and participate in many of the regular camping activities, but do not remain in the area overnight.

The term day camp refers primarily to an activity rather than a type of development. Consequently, such activities can be conducted at almost any park with a

rustic setting and with a minimum of facilities. However, there are a few areas within the county developed or planned to be developed specifically to accommodate day camp activities such as Decker Canyon Camp developed and operated by the City of Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks, and this plan will limit its attention to such areas.

Riding and Hiking Trails are paths that are designed to accommodate horseback riding and hiking through areas removed from vehicular traffic. Ideally, they lead through park-like natural areas. In the urban areas many of the paths are of necessity confined to flood control right-of-ways.

Riding and hiking trails are usually not less than six feet wide and are routed to avoid steep and difficult gradients. Trail stops are rest areas which should be an integral part of each trail system and should be spaced a day's hike or half a day's ride apart. Wherever possible trail stops should be incorporated with parks, campgrounds or guard stations.

The trail system shown on the following map is representative of the Master Plan of Riding and Hiking Trails which was adopted by Los Angeles County in 1956. Additional planning studies by the United States Forest Service for the Angeles National Forest areas have proposed alternate and additional routes beyond those shown on the original plan. These routes have been shown on the following map in order to present as comprehensive and up-to-date proposed county-wide trail system as possible.

The plan also includes that part of the California Riding and Hiking Trail that passes through Los Angeles County. This trail, provided for by State Legislation and operated and maintained by the State in cooperation with both federal and local agencies, functions as a "backbone" route on which a more comprehensive trail system may be developed throughout the State.



Sports Activity Areas

Golf Courses are specialized recreational facilities that require between 120 and 160 acres of land for a standard 18-hole par 72 course. This plan projects one standard 18-hole course for every 90,000 persons. This standard is conservative when compared to either the National Golf Association standard of one course per 20,000 persons or the National Playground Association standard of one course per 54,000 persons.

At the present time, Los Angeles County has a ratio of approximately one golf course per 116,500 persons. However, nearly half of them are closed to the public. Considering only public courses and private ones that are open to the public, the ratio is approximately 1:203,000.

Due to the great demand for courses and the relatively poor effective ratio of courses available to the general public, the role of public agencies in acquisition and development of golf courses is emphasized. Wherever possible, golf courses have been proposed to be elements of regional or recreation parks in order to secure the economies that come with consolidation of recreational facilities.

The proposals contained in the following tables have been made by considering each course's service area in relationship to present and potential population distributions, and by considering availability of land. Expressed in terms of a standard 18-hole golf course, at least 111 courses will be needed by 1985. There are 65 existing courses in Los Angeles County and 49 courses are shown as proposed or developing in the following table, for a total of 114 courses.

Marksmanship Ranges are facilities designed to enable practice in the development of skill in the use of various firearms and the bow and arrow. These include skeet, trap, rifle, pistol and archery ranges. Their regional significance stems from the unusual develop-

ment requirements necessary for safety and the large isolated areas they require. Such factors greatly restrict the site opportunities for development of marksmanship ranges in the urban and suburban areas and, therefore, their attraction is almost always regional.

Winter Sports Areas in Los Angeles County are located in the mountains and are variably developed to accommodate skiing, tobogganing, sledding, snow camping and "snow bunny" (snow play) activities. Many of the slopes are improved to eliminate hazards; also ski lifts and lodges are made available for participants and visitors. Many mountain picnic areas are also used during the winter months for snow play, snow camping and limited sledding and tobogganing. Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena

Sports Arenas are large structures capable of accommodating a variety of indoor sports activities and seating large audiences. To be properly considered a regional facility, such arena must be readily accessible and close to freeways and major highways. Also, there must be adequate parking available, food service and sufficient dressing room facilities. An arena may be used for other than sporting events on occasion but the significance of listing such facility in this plan is the primary use for sporting events.


Further, though this plan does not specifically propose additional arenas it does note that two major areas of population concentration--San Fernando Valley and San Gabriel Valley--are without such facility and a Regional Sports Arena should be developed for each commensurate with the ability to sustain same. Arenas operated by schools and private organizations have not been listed but this plan recognizes the two publicly owned and operated facilities, one in Los Angeles and one in Long Beach.

Stadiums are large structures designed to accommodate large numbers of spectators for a variety of outdoor sports events and special programs. By its very nature, the stadium must be readily accessible and close to the freeway and major highway system.

Further, parking must be adequate, food service available, dressing rooms large and variable and lighting adequate to permit use for any event, especially team sports.

This plan recognizes a number of Stadiums including the Coliseum--"home" of the 1932 Olympic Games--and the famous Rose Bowl in Pasadena. However, this plan further recognizes that increased use of the medium capacity facilities--mostly the school stadiums and therefore not shown in this plan--has given rise to scheduling difficulties. While not proposing a specific facility, it is felt that additional medium capacity stadiums serving regional needs should be considered for other areas of population concentration.

With the exception of Dodger Stadium, private and school stadiums are not included in the following table.



Shore and Water Activity Areas

Water Recreation Areas are inland bodies of water and bodies of protected ocean water both of which provide opportunity for participation in activities such as boating, fishing, water skiing, swimming and shell rowing. Small craft harbors are of such significance as to be listed separately. Nearly all the areas shown in this plan are a part of a regional park and in some cases, such as Hansen Dam and Puddingstone Reservoir, constitute the major recreational element of the park itself.

Lincoln Park

Water Feature Areas are bodies of water which provide opportunity for participation in some of the activities associated with water recreation areas, but on a greatly reduced scale. Examples are small park lakes such as those in Belvedere Park and Echo Park, which offer fishing for children, concessionary boat rides, and model boat racing. Water feature areas may also include water display fountains and ponds of regional interest, although none are named in this plan.

Small Craft Harbors and Launch Facilities have been placed in three categories: Marina; Protected Anchorage or Harbor of Refuge; and Launch Facility.

1. Marina - A marina is a protected small craft harbor for berthing and mooring of small pleasure craft. It offers all services and supplies necessary for non-portable small craft maintenance and operation. In addition, it may offer lodging, restaurants, storage, and other conveniences and attractions for visitors as well as resident and transient boaters. It may also have some launch capability for portable small craft.

2. Protected Anchorage or Harbor of Refuge - A protected anchorage is a small craft harbor designed primarily to provide boaters safe shelter in time of storm or when suffering mechanical breakdown. It may also be used as a temporary layover and rendezvous point for vessels in transit. It should normally offer only semi-permanent and temporary buoy mooring and may also offer services and supplies and launch capability for operation of portable small craft.

3. Launch Facility - A launch facility is a facility that enables launching and recovery of portable small craft. It requires an extent of still, protected water; a firm ramp which extends a certain distance below the surface of the water for trailer launching and/or cranes for sling launching and adequate parking for boat trailers and cars.

This plan identifies all existing and potentially developable sites in Los Angeles County including Santa Catalina Island as based on studies and recommendations of Small Craft Harbors and County Engineers. The total capability as reported in the plan therefore represents the ultimate capability of the Los Angeles

County shoreline plus the known capability of existing and future inland bodies of water.

This plan recognizes an ultimate capability of daily launch and recovery capability of approximately 6,500 small craft, berthing capability of approximately 20,000 and mooring capability of approximately 600.



Beaches identified in this plan are the sections of the county's ocean shoreline which are suitable for swimming, surfing, sunbathing, volleyball and other beach-oriented activities, whereas the other sections of the shoreline are listed under Regional Parks, Reservations, Roadside Rests, Shoreline Access Facilities, Small Craft Harbors and Launch Facilities and Vista Points.

Excluding the frontage of the commercial harbors, approximately 36 miles of the 67 mile Los Angeles County mainland shoreline is in public ownership. The remaining shoreline frontage is in private ownership, the greater portion of which is in unincorporated county territory. The Regional Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors adopted the Master Plan of Shoreline Development in 1945 and it has formed the basis for orderly shoreline acquisition and development which this plan recognizes and strongly suggests the continuing implementation of same.

The beaches in the following table are parts of the seven sections of shoreline into which the county was divided in the shoreline plan and are listed in sequence from the Ventura County to the Orange County boundaries. The stage of development indicated for each is general because of the multiplicity of jurisdictions controlling beach frontages and the varying degrees of public acquisition and development.

Shoreline Access Facilities are designed to provide public access to the shoreline for activities such as surf casting, pole fishing, skin and scuba diving, underwater photography, exploration of marine life in tidal pools, bird watching, beachcombing, sightseeing, hiking and other forms of nature study. This plan recognizes that many of these uses are incompatible with surf and sand beach activities, and further that they are better adapted to rugged and rocky segments

of the shoreline which are unsuitable for bathing and boating.

These facilities should provide: parking and sanitary facilities; a path to the shore; public right-of-way paralleling the water for a depth of at least 30 feet from mean high tide, where possible, and extending laterally from the point of access as far as topography and safety permit.





Cultural Activity Areas

Amphitheaters are recreation facilities consisting of outdoor theaters primarily in use during the summer season. They usually consist of banks of seats rising progressively in front of a stage which may be enclosed. The amphitheater represents one of the oldest forms of recreation facility dating back to the Greek "Classical Age" and it is noteworthy that the classical use (instrumental performance, drama and dialogue) is carried on in today's programming of concerts, drama, ballet and lectures. The most noted one in Los Angeles County is the Hollywood Bowl with its annual "Symphony Under the Stars" summer program. Somewhat smaller but almost as prominent are the Greek Theater in Griffith Park and the Pilgrimage Theater.

Several additional amphitheaters are proposed in this plan, mostly as integral parts of regional parks, recognizing the need for these in several parts of the county deficient in such facilities at present.



Historical Structures and Sites must be one or more of the following:

1. A site or structure at which or in which an historically significant event took place, which is interpreted to mean an event that marked a turning point in the history of the County, State or Nation or which marked a beginning, change, or end of an institution or way of life affecting all or a major portion of the populace;
2. An authentic and unique structure or group of structures possessing distinct architectural features that depict a period of growth in the history of the County, State, or Nation that has passed or is passing into antiquity, or an authentic structure that was once occupied by a person who was a principal in an historically significant event;
3. An element of an institution having historical significance to the growth of the region;

4. Any site or structure designated a state or national historical monument by the appropriate state or federal agency.

This plan shows perhaps a surprisingly large number of such locations but in doing so it recognizes the rich heritage of the county, especially the tremendous influence of the early Spanish and Mexican interests here. This list alone suggests that we are not nearly so young or new as we are often considered to be. El Paseo de Cahuenga Park, is an illustration of this. In 1769, even prior to the American Revolution, Gaspar de Portola led an historic expedition from Baja, California to Monterey and established a camp near where today Cahuenga Boulevard intersects Barham Boulevard. This journey opened the way for a series of subsequent activities including the establishment of the California missions by Junipero Serra and the settlement of El Pueblo de Los Angeles itself.




Banning Mansion

Observatories and Planetariums are structures that house telescopic equipment with which celestial bodies are explored and studied, and in which pertinent exhibits and displays are incidentally made available to the interested public. Such displays and exhibits are supplemented by scheduled lectures and demonstrations.

The Carnegie Institution Observatory on Mt. Wilson is, of course, one of the most important observatories in the world and houses the famous 100-inch mirror reflecting telescope, the world's first of such magnitude. The Zeiss Planetarium at Griffith Park is one of few such installations in the world.

This plan recognizes these two installations as significant regional recreation facilities.







Arboreta and Botanic Gardens are facilities at which groups of plants are cultivated and identified for general or specialized interest. They may also contain areas for botanical and horticultural experiment and research. One of the largest in the county is the Los Angeles State and County Arboretum in Arcadia which conducts educational and research programs. Equally well-known but more specialized ones are Descanso Gardens in La Canada, known for its blooming ornamental plants, and Huntington Gardens in San Marino, known for an extensive cactus garden and Japanese garden. Brand

Park and Memory Garden near the San Fernando Mission contains a plant collection of historical interest and Lafayette Park in the Wilshire area has a special fragrance garden for the blind. The Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden is primarily a graduate school of Botany but maintains extensive grounds featuring native flora. No specific additional facilities are proposed in this plan but it is recommended that the county should encourage bequests and gifts of private gardens to the public, especially if of rare and/or scientific interest.

Zoos are combinations of zoological gardens and scientific institutions in the most literal translation. However, from a recreational standpoint, a zoo can best be characterized as a simulated natural habitat for the keeping and exhibition of wild animals. Zoos have however come to include **Specialized Animal Exhibits** sometimes called children's zoos. This category also includes specialized animal exhibits where a single or a specialized group of animal species is featured such as the case with the Arabian horses at the California Polytechnic College in Pomona. The only zoo in this plan which provides a regional service at this time is the zoo located and presently being rebuilt at Griffith Park.




Griffith Park Zoo (under construction)



Scenic Experience Areas

Roadside Rests are parking areas along roadways that provide resting places for drivers and passengers in order to reduce fatigue. They are usually small areas that provide shade, water, picnic tables and sanitary facilities.

Roadside rests could also ideally function as information centers for tourists entering the metropolitan area. Three such special roadside rests are proposed in this plan.

Roadside rests have not been a common feature of the highways in California, but recent state legislation and appropriations will hopefully give a boost to the whole program. This plan recognizes the need for same in the County and therefore, proposes a rather considerable number of such rests dispersed in the main along the heavily traveled highways and includes the proposals of both the State Division of Highways and County Department Parks and Recreation as well as others.



A vista point is often an element of a park, a scenic drive or other type of specialized facility, but may also

be an independent facility. The following table includes the more spectacular ones in the county. Development of scenic drives will provide vista points as an integral part of same which this plan recognizes as possible worthy additions when specifically identifiable.


