 - What can and should happen in the community?
 - Community members are key experts.
- Community Planning Tools
 - o Land Use Policy. Where should uses go?
 - o Zoning. Where are uses allowed?
 - o Implementation Actions. How do we put policy into action?

2. Project Information

- General Plan and Area Plans
 - LA County General Plan Purpose
 - Foster healthy, livable, and sustainable communities.
 - Conserve natural resources.
 - Shape communities to provide diverse housing near jobs and services.
 - East San Gabriel Valley Area Plan Purpose



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- Adapt the General Plan to a local scale.
- Identify strategies that fit the community.
- Set funding priorities
- Work with adjacent jurisdictions to solve regional issues.
- East San Gabriel Valley Planning Area
 - o **Area:** 52 sq. mi / 33,000 acres
 - o **Population**: ~1 million people in total, ~250,000 in unincorporated
 - Key Characteristics:
 - Natural features: Puente Hills, San Jose Hills, San Gabriel Mountains and River
 - Area as a significant amount of outdoor recreational opportunities.
 - Diverse population.
 - Auto-oriented community design.
