10/14/2025	Dorothy Wong	Meeting #6	[Re: Creating a public LA County map of oak trees] In Altadena, we've lost so many trees. The oak trees are still standing, many of them, trying to heal. I like what you are doing, and trying to, really help the oak trees. Sometimes it feels futile, so I do like the [oak tree] map idea because a lot of times, people ask me, "Can this tree get cut down?", "what is happening?", or "someone's cutting down a tree!" There is a lot of fear happening in our community because there is so much tree loss - especially native trees like the oak trees. So I think that having us be more aware in the future - like with public education - can help. How can we help educate the community more?	LA County Planning is working on an online data hub called TreeHub, a centralized, one-stop destination for tree data and mapping efforts across LA County departments. The intended purpose of TreeHub is to facilitate finding relevant and updated tree information for both LA County staff and the public to foster stronger coordination and collaboration within LA County, across various governments, for researchers and conservation groups, as well as community groups and individuals. People are building back to where their property was before, but then the oak trees happened to grow over the decades. And so, how does that actually play into the rebuilding now [that there are] 30 extra years of canopy? So I think there's a balancing act there and I'm not quite sure [where the balance is]. You know, I feel hopeless for some of the oak trees because people are building more, trying to build back where their structure was before and it will really take a good arborist . . . then I just heard there are a limited number of foresters for the County. That is a little concerning. How can we work on trainings for the community or getting more arborists involved?	Due to the unusual circumstances around the Eaton and Palisades fires, rebuilding in Altadena is being handled by dedicated planners from the Current Planning Division's Recovery unit. When vehicles are parked within the Tree Protected Zone (TPZ), the vehicles were moved outside the TPZ. 2. When impermeable paving was installed within the TPZ, the paving was removed to reduce impacts in the TPZ. 3. When a shed was located within the TPZ, the shed was moved to a new location outside the TPZ.

There, you can download the latest regulation, draft regulation, and really understand what is being proposed. It will help a lot to read what is in there to understand that the BOF is <u>considering</u> the protection of trees and local ordinances, like the LA County Oak Tree Permit ordinance. And also attend the Board of Forestry & Fire Protection workshop on 10/23. 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10/14/2025	Martin Batistelli	Meeting #6	What's supposed to be done when the growth of an oak tree infringes on existing roads and structures I was thinking of where the oak trees are not in the public right away, but you've described as the protected area as being out to the drip line, or maybe even beyond that. If the drip line of the tree is now underneath the roadway - how do we deal with that?	If you think the oak tree may be a hazard, we will ask the resident to contact County Forestry Division and inquire about a no-cost Emergency Oak Tree Permit. The County Forester will make a free site visit to assess the oak tree and provide recommendations. The LA County Forestry Division's Environmental Review Unit phone: 818-890-5719 If the oak tree may be a potential safety hazard in the public right-of-way, we will refer the case to LA County Public Works (PW). PW has certified arborists who will assess the oak tree and perform any necessary work. If the oak tree may be a potential safety hazard and may be impeding utilities, utilities are exempt from regulations in the Oak Tree Permit ordinance and do not need an Oak Tree Permit to impact oak trees.

What happens if nothing is being developed - a developer is not doing anything - but there is just an individual homeowner with a tree in their yard and the tree is growing? A neighbor of mine trimmed a limb and the limb turned out to be diseased. It was larger than what was allowed, but it was fortunate that the limb was trimmed off because a few weeks later, there was a large windstorm and the limb would have likely broken off and could have possibly injured somebody or damaged other property. So my neighbors have expressed fear of this ordinance.	If you think the oak tree may be a hazard, we will ask the resident to contact County Forestry Division and inquire about a no-cost Emergency Oak Tree Permit. The County Forester will make a free site visit to assess the oak tree and provide recommendations. I mean, if you have to call somebody out a second time, you have, you know, another large expense. Tree trimming is not cheap.	Please consider starting with LA County Forestry - ask them to come out first for an assessment to avoid unnecessary or potentially misinformed arborist visits. If you think the oak tree may be a hazard, we will ask the resident to contact County Forestry Division and inquire about a no-cost Emergency Oak Tree Permit. The County Forester will make a free site visit to assess the oak tree and provide recommendations. Specifically with reference to the moratorium issue, which, you know, I'm particularly interested in. I understand that there are a lot of reasons why maybe you wouldn't want to do it. And that's fine, but I just want to point out that calling out SB330, I feel like it's an easy answer to be like, oh, there's this line in it that talks about no moratoriums and whatever, and it's an easy way to get out of dealing with the issue, but I don't think that's the complete story, because SB 330 does not apply universally to the state of California, it only applies to what are defined as affected jurisdictions. And affected, it has a definition in the bill. And specifically, any jurisdiction with a population less than 5,000 and not located in an urbanized area is exempt, so a lot of the areas that we're talking about, like Kagle Canyon, for example, certainly does not have anywhere close to 5,000 people, and is not located within an urbanized area. Lopez	Meeting #6	I just want to let Martin know that I posted a Oak Care and Maintenance publication that is on your website: https://planning.lacounty.gov/wp-content/uploads/2022/10/oak-tree-care_20090529.pdf It's a publication, that kind of explains little details, so go to that link, and it gives you some idea, and also give you the phone numbers. I highly advise you, you get an arborist that knows the Oak Tree Permit ordinance, and they will give you the proper advice, so you don't have to [hire arborists] twice. So, when you hire a company, make sure that the arborist that goes with them, or forester that goes with them, somebody who knows the Los Angeles County Oak Tree Ordinance, and will save you quite a bit of time going back and forth. It used to be only in Green Valley area, but now we find it in Ventura County as well. And its Zone of Infestation is expanding, and especially through the movement of firewood. 10/14/2025	Gay Crusius	Meeting #6	I just wanted to say, here in Green Valley, where we, were infected heavily with GSOB, LA County did a GIS map of all the trees in our area, and so we could see what was an amplifier tree. So those are marked in one color, healthy trees are marked in another color, and then GSOB-infected trees that we're keeping an eye on were marked in another color, and then removed trees were also marked. So, it really helped us as a community to see what was going on with our trees. So, I think mapping is extraordinary information. This mapping was done by Melissa Valente from LA County Fire Forestry so we could see what was going on. It's very informative. [Re: LA County Planning's question, "Did the community participate in mapping?"] No, it wasn't something where we interacted with it. She was monitoring it. I don't think it's being continued to be monitored . . . , you have people who are very interested, and people who are not interested. It's just one of those things where if you have a tree, if you've lost a tree in your yard, then you become very, very interested.	Thank you for your comment.

Other than the surviving oaks that are waiting for their time. And, we're hoping for the best, but I think for the community, understanding what's happening, is still important. And then, in order to not be worried about Zone Zero or maxing out space, they cut down this beautiful, mature Deodar [cedar] tree. And so the only trees that are protected are the oak trees. And maybe it can even help us in rebuilding, like, even me, I'm thinking, oh, maybe we put an oak tree in our front yard, you know? Or, you know, I mean, a lot of us are thinking about what we put back for the next generation. Or how we can maybe, partner with, Public Works in the public right-of-way, depending where, our utility undergrounding might happen, might be a good place, now that the oak trees aren't getting cut down because they're in the way, of utility lines. There're a lot that so many of us are still thinking about, because we've lost so much, and the standing trees are the oaks at this point. So, I think having that be a project or just to know that information is available can be helpful. No damaged should be done to oak trees in Zone 0. Second, when you're going to rebuild a LA County Forester will work with you for a Fuel Modification Plan review which will be the landscape of the area, and the oak tree is something to protect and so it will be protected during construction as well. <u>I just posted three links in the chat.</u> 1. The fines that seem to be indicated are not real fines that are going to prevent any, developer from wanting to be able to say, it's nothing to pay, and I can then build a huge building, and so on. I'm concerned about so many things that the majority of trees your'e talking about replacing an old-growth tree, a heritage tree as you call it, it's not even that much of an old-growth one, but it is an old growth. Doesn't come close to replacing what that tree does for another 50 years, at least, especially its impact on all the insects and animals and microbiome and macrobiome that is surrounding the trees. One of the things, if you look at some of the fires, some of the houses that were remaining in the Altadena fire, some of them were surrounded by old-growth oak trees, because they actually protected those houses, and you don't see that happening with anything that's anywhere near small or anything else. The appraised value of the oak tree is calculated according to the most current edition of the Council of Tree and Landscape Appraiser's <i>Guide for Plant Appraisal</i>. The most recent edition is the 10th Edition, Revised. The guide in the existing Oak Tree Permit was named the "Guide for Establishing Values for Trees and Shrubs" but the title of this guide has changed since then. We are updating the Oak Tree Permit to reflect the new title of the guide, the <i>Guide for Plant Appraisal</i>.

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10/16/2025	Kurt Krueger	Alt Meeting #6	One of the questions I asked was, what is it that we can do besides what we've been doing so far that might really make a big change? And I got the reply to be able to, you know, we can talk later, but that doesn't allow the people that are online right now to be able to hear that kind of a response. The people that are quiet, and are not so verbose as some people who've been around a little bit, have taken the opportunity for them. I would put up massive fees, for people having, gone against the whole heart of the reason why we have any kind of oak tree permit and cutting. Because when I saw the permitted, trimming of an oak. That dramatically changes the reach that the oak will ever have. And the whole thing about an oak tree is its reach of its shade, its reach of its wings spreading, so to speak. And that helps to not only the oak; it protects everything around it. And the amount of pruning is going to stop that from being able to spread very far at all. So, what's the purpose of that, if you allow the unimpeded pruning.	One goal of the Oak Tree Permit is to strike a balance that is necessary between the natural world and the built environment, because are more areas become populated in environments where oak trees are plentiful, the greater the need becomes to find a balance between preservation and development. The purpose of the Oak Tree Permit is to limit and minimize impacts to oak trees as much as practicable with the goal to preserve and maintain the health of oak trees in the development process.

Yes, the Oak Tree Permit update includes both Oak Tree Permits without a public hearing (Administrative Oak Tree Permits, also known as Ministerial Oak Tree Permits) and Oak Tree Permits with a public hearing (Discretionary Oak Tree Permits). Our city of Santa Clarita permit is much more liberal than the county's permit, unfortunately. And I had an issue with my neighbor. Even though our county permit says you can only take back 20% of the canopy, this person trimmed almost the whole canopy. I don't think the oaks will live, and we've already had two oak deaths because of that on another street. Do you have a list of qualified tree services? This is because I think when [poor pruning] happens, it is because the tree trimmers just didn't know what they were doing. And the homeowner didn't apply for a permit because the city didn't require permits for cutting limbs on private property. So [the homeowners] didn't get any indication of what they should be doing, and it seems like there would be a way with education to solve that. It seems like one way to address this is to have a list of qualified tree services and then the tree service had to be qualified by coming in for a meeting about what the County ordinance is, and how far they can trim the oak trees back, so they get a little bit of training.	LA County Planning does not keep a list of qualified tree services, but refers applicants instead to the Trees Are Good website: https://www.treesaregood.org/findanarborist/findanarborist We are planning on providing a list of questions for residents to use in order to ensure they hire an arborist who is knowledgeable about best pruning practices for oak trees and the LA County Oak Tree Permit. We are also planning on adding pruning guidelines into the new Development Standards of the Oak Tree Permit update.

And, it's also education of the homeowners.	In the Oak Tree Permit update, we are proposing an Oak Tree Restoration Permit for unpermitted oak tree impacts.
10/16/2025	Lynne Plambeck	Alt Meeting #6	When we worked on the administrative permit, the planning department is now supposed to be, with our settlement agreement, encouraging homeowners to make plans around the oaks, and to avoid them. And if they can't find a place on the property to consider planting [oak trees] on public land as street trees or in a park so that oak tree is not lost. [There was supposed to be] payment into a fund. Where does the money go?	In the Oak Tree Permit update, we are considering codifying development standards for avoiding and minimizing impacts to oak trees.
